God must tearing his hair out as he observes how we choose to use the planet and the free will he gave us!! We may feel impotent but each one of us can do in his/her own small way something to show that basically we have goodness in us. So this year during Lent I challenge you rather than give up something act positively and help someone else and brighten their day and your own as well. WEST CAMEL CHURCHES



Our Children's Holiday Club on Tuesday 13th February went well. The children enjoyed making model thrones and crowns, and joining in songs and games. They also learned about two Bible kings – David, who killed Goliath, and Joash, who became king at the age of seven.

QUEEN CAMEL FLOOD COMMITTEE

The first signs of spring may be showing but recent weather and the extremely sodden ground remains as does the risk of flooding – a guide is never put your flood defences away until after the Bath and West Show!

Following the flash flood in May 2023 there are two strands of work –

<u>Flood Warning</u> - The River Cam Monitoring Group is now established following the meeting of all Parish Councils along the River Cam – water measuring devices will be placed at strategic points, linked to new rain gauges which will give better warning of rising river levels and we should be able to judge at what levels preventative action can then be taken – automatic warnings by text or What's App are being developed. The first monitors have been installed in Blackford and Yarlington. (Sparkford, Queen Camel and West Camel are next)

<u>River Management</u> – Means to better regulate the river flow in high water such as Attenuation Ponds to hold water and then release it slowly are being planned. Funding and working with the Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group, Yeovil Community Rivers Trust, Somerset Council (the Somerset Rivers Authority) and Environment Agency progresses. Linked is work by the PC to ensure the A303, both current and previous works, take better account of flooding risks and appropriate infrastructure put in place.

Somerset Council have started work on the mandated section 19 Investigation into the May 2023 flood. There is no timeline for completion.

Noting the likelihood of flooding and to properties that had hitherto never been flooded before all such households are encouraged to consider their own property flood defences and plans on what to do before, during, after a flood. The QC website has relevant information and useful links.

(An updated booklet on flooding should be available shortly to all PC's along the River Cam to distribute to at risk properties)

Report from the Queen Camel Parish Council:

The Parish Council (PC) did not have a meeting in February but I can report that working groups or committees have been active. The next full PC meeting will be on Monday 18 March 2024 in the Memorial Hall at 7.30pm.

• Following the discussions at the January PC meeting representatives of all the parishes affected by the Hopkins Estates lorries on the local roads met as a pressure group. Working with our MP, Sarah Dyke, their first step is to get some clear answers from Somerset Council (SC) on the position to see what action can be taken. The PC's representatives on this group are Roy Lawrenson and David Lowe.

• As was discussed at the January meeting the threat that the No 1 bus service from Yeovil to Shepton Mallet will stop in mid April becomes closer. We understand that the route has gone out to tender for a modified service. Please use the bus as much as possible and sign our MP's petition by going to https://www.sarahdyke.uk/ campaigns/save-our-buses . If you are able to support the Somerset Bus Partnership's efforts in campaigning to save many bus routes in the county, refer to its website.

• Flooding issues remain of great concern with very high river levels being recorded on on 18 February. Martin Lilley as chairman of the PC's flood committee has reported elsewhere in this magazine on its activities.

• The Playing Field Management Committee met to deal with a lot of management issues on 5 February. It is developing its rota of volunteers to help in maintaining the field. Also the gang mowers have had a log overdue service and, with this unusually warm weather, should be put to use soon. Anyone who can volunteer to help would be most welcome as there are plenty of jobs to be done. The new play area tendering is progressing and there should be more to report in March.

• The Neighbourhood Plan (NP) Working Group met to consider some of the "projects" in the NP and how they can be progressed. The initial focus will be on some highway related matters such as whether SC can install a 20mph speed limit through the whole village from the old school to the new one and how to declutter street signage. There will also be groups looking at footpath accessibility and in log-ging the position on heritage assets.

The PC and many other organisations in the village need volunteers so if you feel you could contribute please contact me or any councillor.

We are also embarking on the restoration of the river bank and its fencing and hope that at least the urgent task of restoring the riverside boundary across the external car park will be started in March.

The Old School Community Garden: some 70 indigenous trees/shrubs (whips) were planted on Tuesday, 20th, and there are more yet to be planted. These are part of a hedging programme that will also be using willow and hazel. The spring bulbs and wildflower seeds planted a few months ago are now starting to show life. Somerset Wildlife Trust needs your help spotting frog spawn this winter . . .

The Frog & Toad Spawn Count, an annual citizen science event hosted by Somerset Wildlife Trust, will be running until 31st March.

People across Somerset — including families, businesses, and wildlife lovers — are being asked to help spot frog and toad spawn in their local area and share their sightings to help Somerset Wildlife Trust build up a better picture of the state of nature in Somerset.

The Trust is encouraging Somerset residents to keep their eyes peeled for any frog and toad spawn they find while out and about, whether it's from their garden pond or spotted during an adventure in the countryside. Once they find the spawn, they're encouraged to snap a picture and upload it to the popular citizen science website, iNaturalist.

Frogs and toads are 'indicator species', which means since they absorb water directly through their skin, they're especially vulnerable to water pollutants like pesticides and are some of the first species to be affected by degradation of the environment and the impacts of climate change. The Frog & Toad Spawn Count is all about encouraging more people to help collect data on these indicator species — allowing Somerset Wildlife Trust and the Somerset Environmental Records Centre (SERC) to build up a better picture of the status of Somerset's wildlife. As this is an annual event, the Trust is also able to compare records from each year, helping it to spot trends in populations and any declines that can be identified.
