Spring is a very special time of year - it speaks of new beginnings. It reminds us of past glories that have been forgotten through the long, dark winter months. The green shoots of bulbs rise up and daffodils, snowdrops, crocuses and bluebells paint spectacular pictures in our gardens and woods...

As we go into February as a Benefice, we start working on discovering the dormant gifts and abilities in our church and village communities. The old Cam Vale benefice of Corton Denham, Sutton Montis, Queen Camel, Sparkford, West Camel and Weston Bampfylde has now joined with North and South Cadbury, Galhampton and Yarlington. We move into a Spring time of a new Benefice. We are in the process of discerning a name for this new Benefice and of working together. All this against a backdrop of a world that sees war, natural disasters and climate change in ever increasing stark reality and a national church that is also perceived to be in quite a bit of disarray. Does this mean more chaos and uncertainty even with what is near and dear?

We must not despair, there is hope and the solution starts with each one of us. It will and does, involve a willingness to embrace change. To recognise that things cannot go on as they have been. To look at the past and celebrate and treasure the good, and to look to the future and see the opportunities and possibilities and embrace them.

Across the Benefice we are now meeting to pray in all the village churches at least once a fortnight. Details will be in the magazines going forward and on the benefice website, or simply text me for further details. These times of prayer last about half an hour and are open to anyone in the community who would like to come along, whether you worship in one of our churches or not. Prayer is the key that will open up the way forward for us.

Recently I was reminded of the story of 'The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe'. In which C S Lewis portrays God as Aslan the lion and how when Aslan returns to Narnia the endless winter is broken. When Aslan returns to Narnia the Witch's magic begins to weaken. Winter in Narnia slowly comes to an end. But the wonderful thing about the transformation from winter into spring in Narnia is that it happens simultaneously with Edmund's own transformation from a selfish and proud person into a humble one.

I wonder perhaps this Spring if each of us too might need transforming, ready to be part of the new beginning that we are being offered. I am excited about this - I hope you are too. Report from the Queen Camel Parish Council:

The Parish Council (PC) met on 20 January 2025. There was a lively debate on a number of issues:

HGVS & Hopkins' lorries: The failure of Somerset Council (SC) or the Police to take action was again documented. SC's inability to

take remedial action on the likely planning issues at Sutton Farm and the Police's lack of interest in checking for breaches on vehicle weight restrictions were forcibly made. Further submissions will be made to SC and Henry Hobhouse, our SC councillor, undertook to get the SC leader and its lead councillor on planning to come and see the issues for themselves. Keeping up political pressure and invoking social media seem the best we can do whilst this most unsatisfactory situation persists. Reporting HGVs to the Police for anti-social behaviour was also another option. Do make your own views known publicly.

A number of Highways issues, **with potholes and blocked drains** being high on the complaints list, were raised. Frustration with SC was again high. The PC raises these problems regularly with SC. Nevertheless, we need an even more focused approach with SC to get matters resolved. Can any parishioners making a complaint to the SC also advise the PC so that a comprehensive follow up can be maintained.

The two potential development sites on the West Camel Road were again discussed. Given the current attitude of the Government to getting houses built, it is going to be a challenge to control developments on these sites even in the context of our Neighbourhood Plan. Nevertheless, the PC is working with the planners to get as good a result for the village as it can. This includes getting suitable affordable housing which could be managed by our Community Land Trust (CLT).

The CLT is about to survey a sample of local residents and businesses on housing and start up business needs, and on health and well being, to enable it to meet local needs better. If you get a survey to complete online, please do so. The findings will not only be useful to the CLT in planning its offering but also to the PC in wider community planning.

The budget was approved with a proposed **5% increased precept** for 2025/26 being agreed. The budget is likely to be very tight and little allowance has been made for any services devolved by SC. The PC did approve a grant of £300 to **Citizens Advice Somerset** as it had lost SC funding and supports those with problems locally.

The next PC meeting is on **24 March 2025**, a week later than usual. The Annual Village Meeting has been set for **Friday 16 May.**

Please let me or any councillor have any comments on the matters mentioned or those you wish to raise.

We conclude with a look at the revolutionary changes of the twentieth century and the challenges and possibilities of the future.



A cold January morning for a cold subject. ' Ice, Fire and Fiords'.

Our speaker Mike Spenser, took us on a whirlwind journey around Iceland. Iceland was formed through volcanic activity and apart from some coastal areas is pretty inhospitable.

It is 4/5th the size of England, with a population of 363,396 in 2024, which is comparable to Norwich. Any settlement with over 1,000 people is called a city!

Mike only saw one major road which goes around the whole island. Various maps show other 'roads' but an unwary driver may well find himself in deep mud or in a river. His advice is 'Stay on the tarmac'.

Coastal areas can look green and attractive, but there is little grazing for sheep and cattle. The only native animal is the arctic fox.

Inland is mountainous; volcanic rock, snow, ice, glaciers, and of course geyzers. These can erupt every 3 minutes and shoot over 250 feet into the air. It is said that it takes only 3 seconds to boil a human in a geyser!

Geothermal activity gives free electricity to the capital, Reykjavik, and to many other towns. And also provides under pavement heating to the capitol. Much industry depends on the free power as well as the many greenhouses which provide much of Icelands food.

Whaling is still one of the main industries but the whale meat is generally only eaten by tourists. A strict quota is granted to whalers each year. 209 Fin whales, and 217 Minke whales per season to be caught.

Whale watching is a huge tourist attraction with half a million tourists arriving to see these wonderful creatures as well as enjoying the warm healing waters of the Blue Lagoon and the rather unearthly interior of the country.

The 2010 Eyjafjallajökull volcanic eruption blew 35,000 feet into the air catching the Gulf stream which affected many countries. The outpouring changed the landscape. The cooled lava can create weird shapes. One tourist declared he would never return to Iceland as one of the black shapes so reminded him of his Mother-in-Law!


