

Editorial

It seems strange to be writing this in the second week in Lent, for the Easter Magazine, but the resurrection stories are so central to the Christian gospel they are relevant at any time of year. They are also some of my favourite stories in the Bible, so I make no apologies for looking at them again. They are stories of human doubt and weakness, as well as stories of reassurance and hope.

Mary, the first to meet the risen Jesus, mistakes him for the gardener. It was an understandable mistake. She could not have thought that Jesus could have risen, but once Jesus said her name, she recognised him, and went to the disciples to declare "I Have seen the Lord".

Then Jesus appears in the upper room, but Thomas is not there and declares that he will only believe if he sees the nail marks and puts his hand in Jesus' side. Thomas only had to see Jesus in front of him to believe that he was risen.

My favourite story is of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. I think they left Jerusalem, disappointed and disillusioned. Jesus had promised so much, but now he was dead, and all those promises had come to nothing. No wonder they did not recognise Jesus when he walked with them and talked to them. It was only when he broke bread with them, something that he had done many times before, that they realised that it was him. They had to see him do something familiar for them to believe. Then they returned to the disciples in Jerusalem to tell them that they had seen the Lord. The disciples told them that Jesus had appeared to Simon as well.

The disciples had returned to their boats to go back to their jobs fishing, once again disappointed and disillusioned. Jesus meets them in familiar surroundings, helps them find fish to catch, and cooks them breakfast. They know it is him but still find it hard to believe. I think that perhaps this was also something they were familiar with. Had Jesus cooked breakfast for them before?

I think that the disciples would have told each other these stories over and over again. To be able to say "The Lord is risen" "He is risen indeed" to each other brought hope and comfort at a time of great turmoil and disappointment in their lives. It was true, Jesus had risen from the dead. The truth they almost dared not believe.

We sometimes find it hard to believe in the risen Christ, and we need the encouragement of other Christians to say, "**He is risen indeed"**, or maybe we need to be the encourager and say to someone else "**He is risen indeed"**.

In Mark's gospel the father of the boy with an evil spirit asks Jesus to "help his unbelief" (Mark 9:24). Could this be something we could do, help someone's unbelief by declaring "**He is risen indeed, Alleluia!**".



There was no scheduled meeting of the Parish Council (PC) before The Camels Magazine went to press as the PC next meets on 24 March 2025. Whilst many of the recurring issues are being dealt with, I have only a few specific matters to report.

The PC held an Extraordinary meeting on 24 February to consider various quotes for the **refurbishment of the car park** by the new play area, given the original preferred contractor had pulled out. A way forward was agreed and the arrangements are hopefully being finalised.

The main issues this month have remained the **Hopkins lorries** and the overall **traffic and speed** through the High Street. Harriet Chappell is doing her best to try and find solutions and if you can help her by volunteering for various traffic monitoring and speed watch efforts that would be much appreciated.

The recruitment process for a new **parish clerk** is progressing as is the PC's plan to co-opt a new **councillor** to fill the casual vacancy.

I hope to be able to report more fully on all these and other matters after the March PC meeting in the next edition of The Camels..

I would ask you to make a note in your diaries that the **Annual Village Meeting** will be on Friday, **16 May 2025** in the Memorial Hall. Invitations will be issued in due course.

Cam Vale Tuesday Group. March meeting 2025

•George Bethal, from the Secret World of Wildlife Rescue came to speak to us.

Pauline and Derek Kidner opened their farm as a visitor attraction in 1984 to implement their farm income. Soon, vulnerable and injured animals were being brought to them by concerned members of the public. Pauline began treating these animals and, in 1992, The Secret World of Wildlife Rescue was founded.

The Charity now deals with approx 5,000 animals, and 50,000 phone calls a year. All animals are assessed and if injuries are severe, sometimes euthanasia is the only answer. George showed some distressing pictures of animals that had been injured, some by thoughtless actions. Rubber bands can cause constriction for tiny mammals seeking food in the undergrowth. Nets in ponds are a danger to grass snakes. Drink cans, wire, string and plastic can be lethal. Lawn mowers and strimmer often cause injuries to hedgehogs and other mammals hiding in our gardens.

We learnt so much about wildlife. A hare, when having to leave its young, will leave them in separate fields to aid survival. Owlets often fall out of trees. Baby Tawny Owls will wait until nightfall and then climb up the tree back to the nest, a feat not learnt by other owl species.

The charity has its own Hospital and a part-time vet. There are outside enclosures suited to individual animal's needs where they can recover. Limited human intervention during this time aids their lessening dependence on humans. Animals are generally released back where they were found so that they recognise their surroundings and know where food can be found.

The Rescue centre is not open to the public, but there are occasional Open Days. Educational otours can be arranged. A fascinating talk.....On closing, any idea how big a polecat is at birth? I was amazed, it's the size of a 50 pence piece.

The Group meets on the first Tuesday of the month in the Memorial Hall, Queen Camel. Our next talk on April 1st is on International Gardens. New members and visitors are welcome. For further information please contact Marion Chapman. Tel 01963 220741.



Somerset Wildlife Trust asks us all to become hoverfly heroes for this year's Wild about Gardens campaign

The Wildlife Trusts and the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) are calling on gardeners across the country to help save hoverflies. This fly family is the second most significant pollinator after bees – some species of hoverfly are known to visit more flowers than bees.

These insects are unsung heroes of many of our ecosystems. Hoverflies visit 52% of crops globally¹, which they either pollinate or protect by eating sap-sucking aphids. Additionally, they pollinate wildflowers, are food for birds and even help break down organic matter in gardens.

Yet, intensive agriculture, harmful pesticides, urban development and climate change have all taken their toll. Hoverfly distribution has seen a 44% decline between 1980 to 2020² and in 2022 the International Union for the Conservation of Nature added hoverflies to its Red List of threatened species.

Hoverflies are masters of disguise. These stingless insects are often mistaken for wasps, bees or even hornets and the different types go by various common names such as Batman, Footballer and Marmalade, thanks to their distinctive markings and colours.

True flies have only one pair of flight wings (whereas bees and wasps have two) and they make up over 280 of the 6000 fly species in the UK. It can be easier to identify them by their behaviour than their looks, because they hover or even zigzag around plants.

Bryony Slaymaker, Wilder Communities Manager at Somerset Wildlife Trust, says:

"Hoverflies are a tiny but essential part of the natural world, and we'd love everyone in Somerset who has a garden, allotment, outdoor space or even just a window box to consider making their space more inviting for these special creatures! You can access lots of free tips and tricks to make your garden more wildlife-friendly on our website."

Vicki Hird, author of Rebugging the Planet and strategic agriculture lead for The Wildlife Trusts, says:

"Hoverflies are the hidden heroes of our gardens and countryside – but whatever their shape, size or disguise, they are critical for our food security. They can thrive in well-managed woodlands and wetlands, but there is also so much we could be doing in our gardens to help.

"Providing a range of flowers to feed on through the year, ponds for larvae to grow in, dead wood to lay eggs in and even a few aphid pests for them to feed on, and you will have these gardeners' friends for life. And they are so helpful, and don't bite or sting. You can be a hoverfly champion by telling friends and family to cherish them."

Helen Bostock, Senior Wildlife Specialist at the Royal Horticultural Society, says: "We'd like people to open their garden gates to hoverflies this summer. These incredible insects help pollinate our plants, keep aphids in balance and break down rotting matter in the garden. Gardeners can help attract them by planting open, easily accessible flowers. In spring, they'll be drawn to aubretia. In summer, they'll love blackberry flowers, oxeye daisy, marigolds, fennel, cow parsley and poppies. Come autumn, they can be seen on heather, aster and even common ivy."

Experts from the two charities have designed a series of projects for gardeners to help hoverflies in spaces large or small. These include:

• Pollinator plant boxes: Ideal for small-space gardens or balconies, these can be jam-packed with flowering plants to suit the season, representing a giant buffet for visiting hoverflies.

- Hoverfly lagoons: These are pools of shallow water where fallen leaves create a perfect breeding ground for many of the hoverfly species which have aquatic larvae.
- Larvae nurseries: Log piles and even shrubs can make perfect homes for hoverfly larvae.
